My dear Sir

Lord Howe called me off from Sir P. Arden
when I was just fairly entered into the subject. It will require
such frequent reference to my books as well as notes, & sug-
gest so much in the progress of the paper that I cannot hope
to finish it sooner than for your winter number. At present
I am busy upon Telford's Life & Narrative of his Labours,
concerning which I wrote to you some months ago. This I
shall be able to complete before I leave home, which will
be the latter end of July, & I think it will prove a curious
piece of art.

I have just happened to meet with an account of
Guesche's book in the Gentlemen's Magazine. Then I
perceive that he enters upon a field in which I am
not qualified to follow him, - that of Anglo-Saxon literature,
my knowledge of that language being very imperfect: but
with regard to English mythology, the only fear I should have
would be that of repeating what I have said elsewhere.

My present intention is to pass four or five weeks
in Normandy & Bretagne & return to England early
in September. Before I read how again I have to

make one or two visits in the South, of some duration, -
long enough to employ myself with advantage upon the
Greek work.

I wish the report concerning H. Taylor were true.
You may have heard another report which has ever
been foundation, - that I was exceedingly independent with
you for many months in written letters concerning
William Smith. As soon as this report reached me
I laid an embargo upon the press & commenced
it that I did not care a straw upon about the matter.

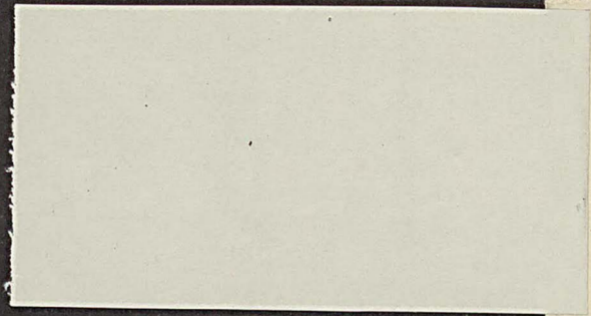

Southey the Poet, who died some three years ago, his once fine faculties all gone into eclipse for several years before. A tall lean figure (of unusual, unexpected tallness, when he rose from his chair), of clear brown complexion, and copious white hair; eye and look of the utmost excitability; now flushing red in the face and now black, - as if his hair had still been dark, and his age 16 instead of 60, as it was when I saw him first. A rigorously methodic man withal; did more work than any other writer of his time. An interesting and on the whole truehearted man.
