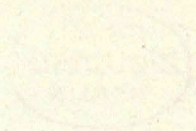

If you are not otherwise engaged tomorrow, I will have the honour of waiting upon you in the Library, & dining with you in the Crown. — Meantime I have the

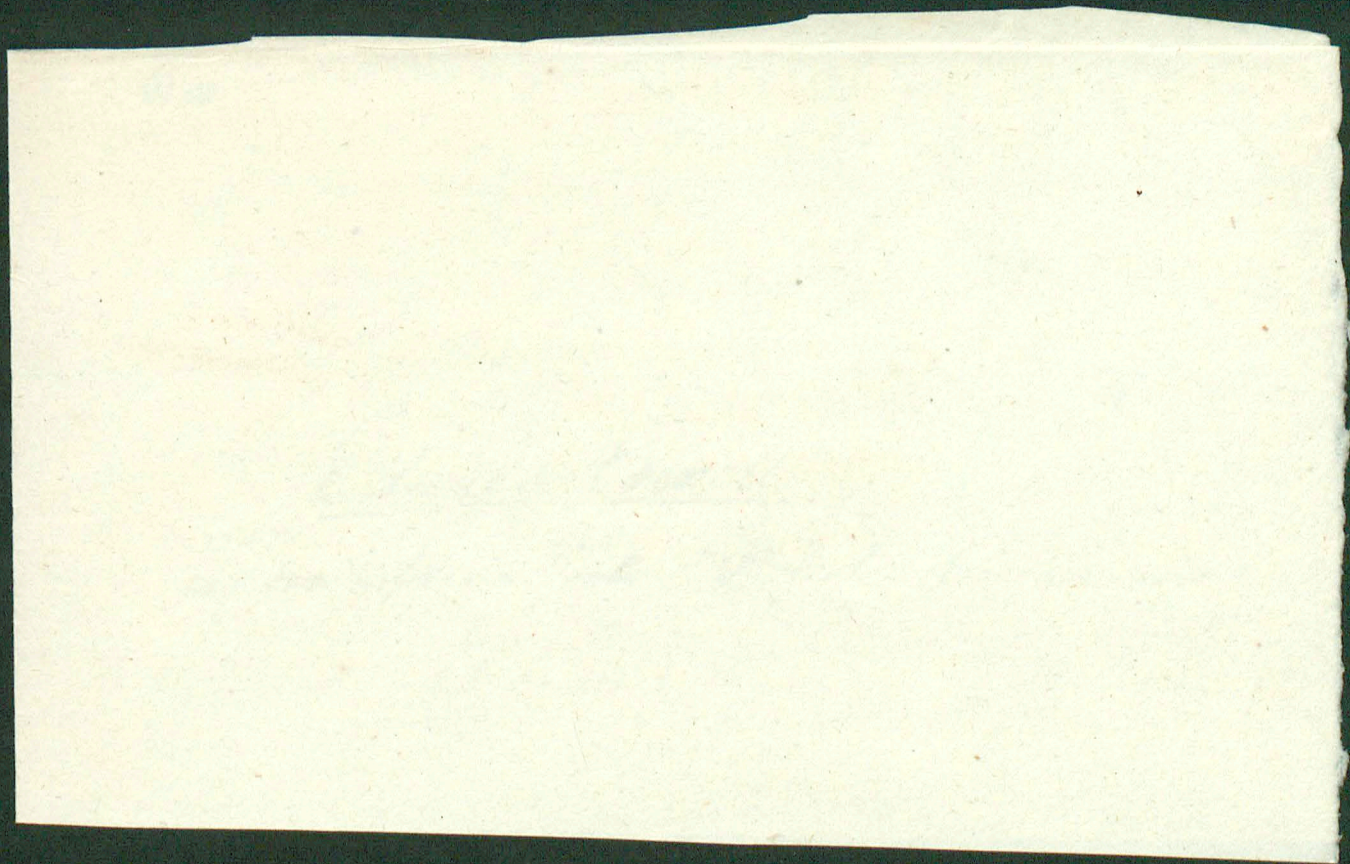

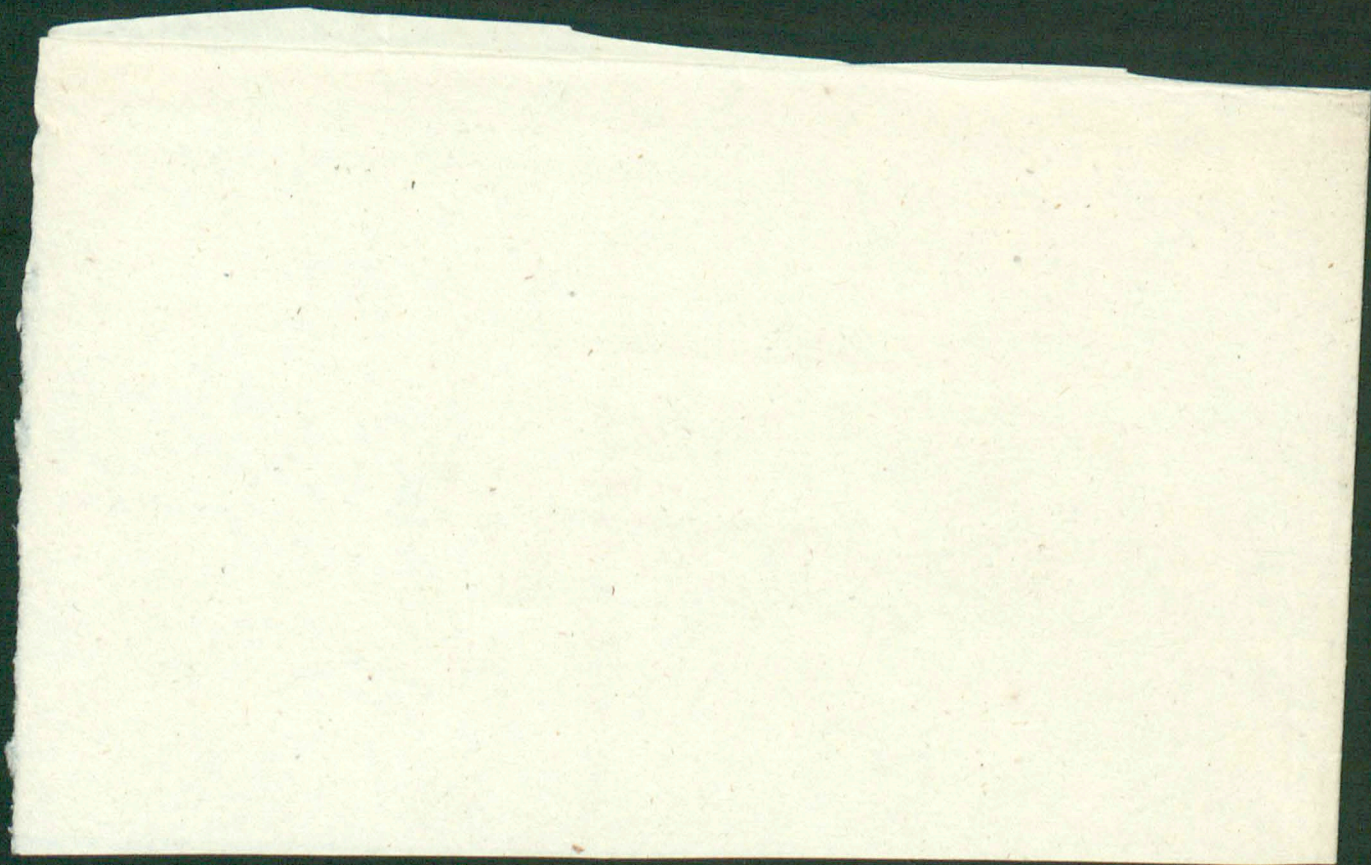
