How To Plan Auto Vacation Costs

Chicago — (UP) — If you're planning a trip by car, either this vacation season or the next, it's best to figure out the number of days and dollars you can afford, the Chicago Motor Club advises. For two passengers, says the club, \$50 a day should be allowed, provided that you're not travelling more than 300 miles a day... Car operating costs — \$9. This amount is computed at 2 1/2 cents per mile for gas and oil. The extra \$1.50 goes for maintenance expenses. Meals — \$8. The cost is figured at 75 cents for breakfast, \$1.25 for lunch and at least \$2 for dinner. Lodgings — \$8. Rates at hotels and motor courts appear to be about the same throughout a traveling family will save on garage charges and tips at a motel. Overnight accommodations for two range from \$4 to \$10, depending on the type and locality.

Stretch the Dollar
Admissions, amusements, and tools — \$2. This covers admission for such places as shrines and other attractions. Incidental, souvenirs and emergencies — \$3. This includes roadside refreshments, postcards, films, toothpaste, etc. If you take along two children say teen-agers, the food bill will be doubled, the club says. Lodging cost will jump about one-half and other charges will be increased. The total bill will be about \$46 daily for a family of four. To stretch your travel dollar, the motor club suggests: 1. Drive during the early part of the day so you can spend plenty of time to find the type of accommodation you want at a price you can afford. 2. Avoid "tourist traps." Visit travel attractions that are worthwhile. 3. Plan your vacation, if possible for the spring and autumn, thereby avoiding peak travel seasons.

SLUGGER TED KLUSZEWSKI PROVES SELF AS FRIENDLY AS HE IS BIG

Tops In RBIs, Homers In 1954

The Cincinnati Redlegs are flexing their biceps in order to gain a home run edge over their rivals. The man who is contributing his share in this plan is Ted Kluszewski, a star who is as friendly as he is big. The husky Kluszewski still has fans talking about a tremendous home run he made this year in a game against the St. Louis Cardinals. It was only the beginning of a long line of homers that Big Klus has been clouting. In the ninth inning of the game, with the St. Louis Cards in front 5 to 1, Klus hit Luis Arroyo's first pitch high up into the right field bleachers, his longest shot into the seats this season. Six of his first 11 homers were hit in Cincinnati.

NATIVE OF ARGO

It was not so very long ago the Big Klus was associated with football. It is hard to imagine what the Redlegs would have done had the baseball slugger decided on a grid career. Kluszewski was an All-Conference end at Indiana University when Bo McMillin's gridiron squad won the Big Ten football championship. Kluszewski had the stuff gridiron mentors dream about. He was big, husky, and fast. His coaches predicted a great playing future for this POLISH LAD who is a native of Argo, Ill. But the occupational disease that befalls most gridiron hopefuls seized him; He despised spring practice. His only outlet was to find another sport. He took up baseball, although he had never before played any hand ball. Within a short time he made the Indiana varsity baseball team and came to the attention of the Cincinnati Redlegs. He is now one of the highest paid and most feared sluggers in the game. He has been rightly tabbed "Hercules with a bat".

PAST RECORD

Kluszewski's record during the past few years has been an impressive one. In 1952 he hit 16 home runs while batting a fancy .320. His average was approximately the same in 1953, .316, but his home run output soared to 41. Last year he was among the league's top run producers. He led the Major Leagues in homers and RBIs.

KOLSKI BOOSTERS PNA WIN 2ND MIDWEST SEMIPRO PLAYOFF TILT

Whip Cole Lenzi, 10 To 3; Tom Hoffman Stars On Mound; Schultz, Rzendzian Ted Hoffman, Caminiti Pace Drive; Cummings, Commer Top Lenzi

Righthander Tommy Hoffman blanked the Cole Lenzi baseballers on 3 hits during the first six innings (with the Kolski Boosters PNA sporting a 10 to 0 lead at that juncture) and Lewandowski yielded 4 bingles and 3 runs in the last 3 frames, as the defending champion Greater Midwest Semipro Baseball league Edwin T. Kolski's walloped their long-time adversaries, 10 to 3, last Sunday afternoon at Lenzi Park for their second straight triumph in the 1955 Cup Playoffs.

A timely attack, which saw Schultz hit 2 triples and a single; Wasni a triple; Ed Rzendzian a double and a single; and Ted Hoffman and Leroy Caminiti 2 singles apiece — off the slinging of Willison (the starter and loser) and Gorniak — decided the issue as early as the first two innings, with the Kolskis ahead by 5 to 0. They plated 5 more markers in the 4th for a 10 to 0 advantage. Cole Lenzi fashioned its first runs, 2, in the last of the 8th, and added another spurious counter in the 9th. Commer clouted a double and a single, and Cummings a brace of singles to pace the Lenzi offensive.

KOLSKIS OFF TO EARLY LEAD

The Kolskis lost little time getting into the scoring column with a pair of markers in the first half of the first frame. Modzierz walked with one out and moved to second on a wild pitch. Rzendzian doubled, scoring Modzierz. Ted Hoffman walked. Caminiti singled to center, scoring Rzendzian. The second produced a trio of runs and a 5 to 0 Kolski advantage. Wasni drew a pass. Tom Hoffman bunted and both runners were safe when Third Baseman Binder threw too late to second. Schultz lined a triple to right-center, scoring Wasni and Tom Hoffman. Ted Hoffman singled to left, scoring Schultz.

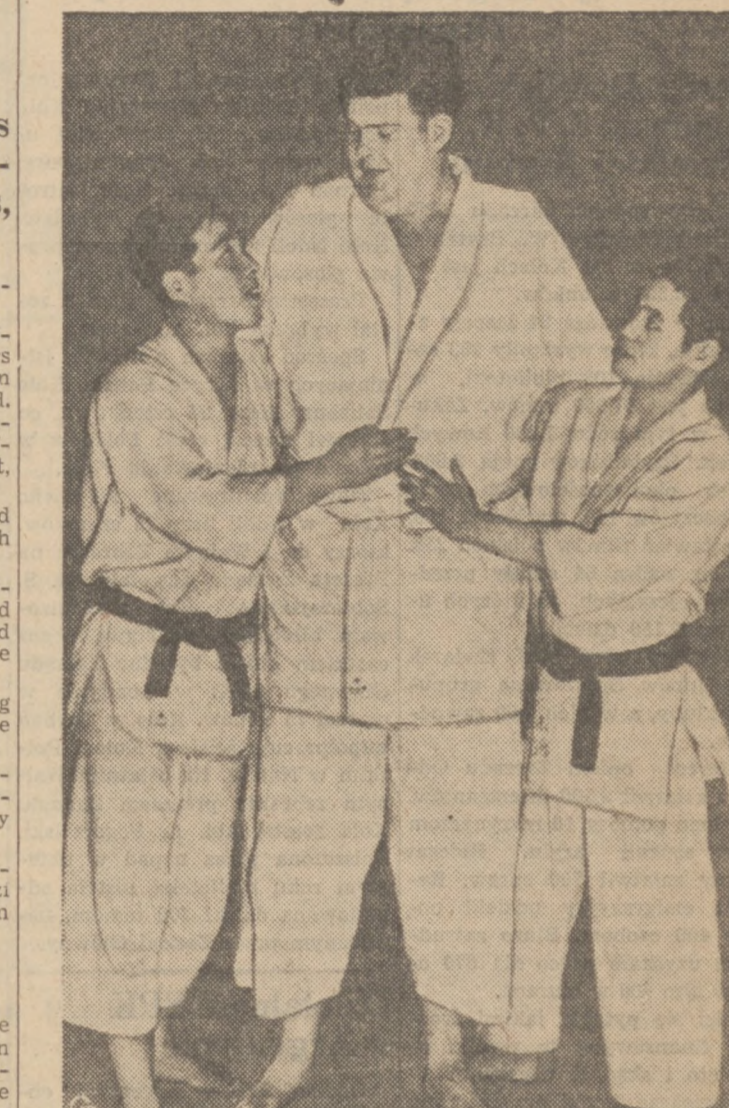
FOUND ON CAMPUS

The Cincinnati ball club trained at Bloomington, Ind., the site of Indiana University. After the league had finished their workouts on the varsity diamond, the collegians would take over. Some one noticed Kluszewski practicing with his Indiana teammates. He was powdering the ball farther than any of the wartime professionals. Manager Bill McKeechie of the Redlegs was called to watch.
