Oakley, Wednesday, July 27; Douglas pk., 14th and Albany, Thursday, July 28; Davis Square, 45th and Marquette, Tuesday, August 2; Garfield park, 100 N. Central Park, Thursday, August 4; West Pullman, 123rd and Stewart, Thursday, August 4; Palmer park, 111th and Indiana, Friday, August 5; Welles park, 2330 W. Sunnyside, Friday, August 5; Norwood park, 5801 N. Natoma, Friday, August 5; and Riss park, 6100 W. Fullerton, Saturday, August 6.

Top-Ranking 2-Year-Olds Vie In \$200,000 Arlington Park Futurity

It's hats off to the budding two-year-old division at Arlington Park this week where on Saturday the \$200,000 gross Arlington Park Futurity, richest offering of the year thus far for juveniles, steps into the nation's spotlight.

Every top-ranking two-year-old in training is numbered among the hefty roster of 296 eligibles to this year's 6 furlong Futurity, which last year went to T.V. Lark in a resounding upset over Bally Ache and Venetian Way.

To increase interest in Futurity week, Arlington has added the \$20,000 added Meadowland Handicap for Wednesday, the 1-1/8 miles grass feature expected to lure Claiborne Farm's popular stretch-running Dunce, Hasty House Farms' Martini II and John Zitznik's venerable turf ace, Manassas.

Heading the probable Futurity roll-call is Mrs. Herbert Herff's Intensive, a classy son of Intent who rapidly had become the outstanding juvenile in the midwest area, winning the George Woolf Memorial and, more recently, the Hyde Park Stakes.

Intensive rocketed to stardom quite early this year when he snatched off with the Gulfstream Park Dinner Stakes in Florida this winter, then wisely was turned out to await the more lucrative events this spring and summer.

He resumed action this spring at Washington Park and promptly humbled Ford-Kelty's high-running Iron Rail in the \$10,000 George Woolf Memorial.

51 Report For Philadelphia Eagles Workouts; Open Drills Wednesday

A quietly confident Buck Shaw, his staff and 51 candidates for the 1960 Philadelphia Eagles' football team — four more in the College All-Star camp — checked in at Hershey, Pa., Sunday firing the opening round of the annual training grind.

First order of business will be in the hands of the team doctors, Dr. Mike Mandarino, physician, and Dr. Frank Loftus, dentist. All players are required to undergo a complete physical and dental examination.

The cameramen will run things on Tuesday but on Wednesday (July 27) the business of knocking heads together will get underway. Less than three weeks later the Birds will fly to Los Angeles to open a six-game pre-season schedule that closes in Hershey Saturday night, September 17 against the championship Baltimore Colts.

With 29 veterans returning from last year's squad that surprised by finishing in a second place tie, hopes are high with Shaw and his aides, Nick Skorich, Jerry Williams, Charley Gauer and Frank Kiroly. After more than three weeks of diligent soul-searching, the strategy board will put into practice its overall plan designed to make the Eagles fly higher than at any time since 1949 when they last won the championship.

One of the innovations involves halfback Theron Sapp, a top 1959 rookie from Georgia. Last year Sapp spelled regular left half Billy Barnes and carried only 41 times for 145 yards but it is Shaw's plan to utilize his blocking ability as well as his power running and slick pass catching.

Let's Go Fishin'



"Stood my rod in the corner the other day and don't expect to ever pick it up again."

This was a comment I received in the mail bag recently and it is representative of a rather widespread opinion on the crowded conditions on many of our lakes and streams.

"Lake's fished out," another man said. "Too much pleasure boating" was another claim. "Got blisters on my elbows from rubbing against other fishermen," said a disgusted trout angler.

of a dozen surrounding smaller lakes. I found the same situation in Maine, California, and in the Ozarks, and I have a hunch that it is occurring throughout the U.S. and Canada.

A friend and I unloaded our boat at a bridge crossing a medium sized stream and we were advised that the fishing was poor by several men squatting on the bank. Drifting down stream, we encountered two other boats whose occupants stated that their success hadn't been any better. After we portaged around a small dam, however, we saw no more boats, and only one fisherman in a 7 mile stretch of river. He was a farm kid with the usual crop of freckles, and when we asked him how he was doing he hauled up a stringer of fish which would have made a fish-warden raise his eyebrows.

We caught fish on that little fishing jaunt—not because we were more skillful than the other anglers, but because we were fishing in waters which hadn't seen any fishing pressure for many years.

CATCH A CRAWDAD The song goes "you get the line and I'll get the pole, and we'll go down to the crawdad hole." This is a sensible ditty, since fresh water crawfish is as tasty as its blue water relative.

To catch crawfish, tie a piece of salt pork on a string and fish along a mud bank. When you have a bite, let the crawdad get a good hold on the bait before you gently raise him from the water and shake him off in a pail. As with other fish, the biggest crawdads live in deep water.

When you have a "mess" (a pound or so) clean, wash and boil as you would shrimp. But, if you're feeling adventurous, substitute beer for water. Ten minutes and a quart of beer should do the trick. Peel and remove tails, and serve with additional tankards of your favorite brew.
