Rostenkowski All-Stars' 6-Run 9th Fails; Pulaski Wins, 9-8 Kohnke And Ceglarski Pace Victors; Bolger, Drzonek, Lewandowski Feature For The Losers

The Dan Rostenkowski Youth Council All-Stars, who bowed to Pulaski Park 11 to 9, earlier this season at Burr Field, were victimized, 9 to 8, in a return game last week at Pulaski Park. Outhit, 16 to 11, by the All-Stars, the Pulaski softballers built up a 9 to 2 lead in the first 8 innings of play and then hurled back a furious last inning Rostenkowski offensive, which produced six runs, one short of creating a deadlock.

Lukas was credited with the victory while Schimanski was charged with the setback for Manager Greg Demos' All-Stars. Kohnke rapped out 3 hits and Ceglarski 2 for the winners. Each of them clouted a homer as did Kleba. Bolger slammed out 4 hits, Drzonek 3 and Lewandowski 2 for the All-Stars.

The Rostenkowski crew led by 1 to 0 at the end of the first inning and it was not until the third frame that Pulaski scored, plating 3 markers, to assume a 3 to 1 advantage. A run in the top half of the sixth by the All-Stars sliced the Pulaski margin to 3 to 2, but the latter countered with 2 in its turn at bat to lead by 5 to 2.

ALL-STARS RALLY FAILS

Best Of Three "Drag Race" Carded For Great Lakes Dragway Sept. 25

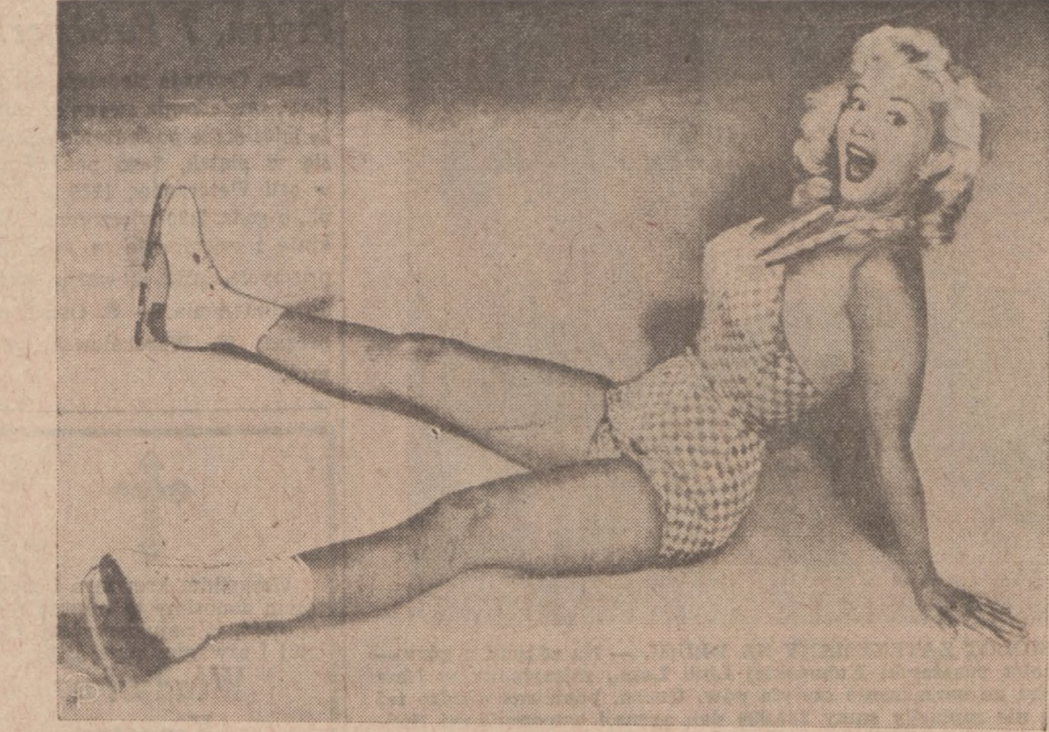
On July 10th, during the "National Championship" drag races at the "Great Lakes Dragway" at Union Grove, Wisconsin, Chris Kawaminas of Chicago, Illinois, brought his famous "Chizler" out for the last run of the day and went through the traps at a speed of 187.50 M.P.H. This speed equaled the track record, and gave him an exact tie with Art Malone, driving the number one rated dragster in the country, the "Swamp Rat" from Tampa, Florida. As a result of this tie, the "Chizler" and the "Swamp Rat" ran a best two out of three match races at Union Grove, Wisconsin, with the "Chizler" taking the win by just two miles per hour, on August 14th, on this runoff.

Don Garlits was driving the "Swamp Rat". His driver, Art Malone, had decided to build and drive his own dragster, and in the past two months he has moved up the ranks fast, beating every machine he has run against. This impressive record moved him up fast in the ratings, and he now holds the lofty position of number three in the country. Malone has now challenged Kararlinsnes and his "Chizler" for their number one spot, and the challenge has been accepted. Malone is undefeated and he is the only driver to ever have beaten the "Chizler".

This will be the best two out of three runs, and will be held this coming Sunday, September 25th, at the "Great Lakes Dragway", Union Grove, Wisconsin. Malone beat the "Chizler" earlier this year while driving the "Swamp Rat", and has stated that he feels he can beat it again. He feels his new dragster, the "Little Rebel", seems like an even faster machine than the "Swamp Rat", which he drove for over a year. He has turned over the 190.00 M.P.H. mark, three of the past eight weeks, while going below the 180.00 M.P.H. only once. Although the "Chizler" holds the "World's" record of 204.54 M.P.H., it more consistently turns between the 180.00 M.P.H. and the 190.00 M.P.H. mark.

Each of them contributes something to the memory book. Like Paavo Nurmi sprinting around the track with the Olympic torch at Helsinki; the bands playing "Waltzing Matilda" at Melbourne; and the eerie "Miracle Of The Snows" at Squaw Valley when the storm stopped for the opening ceremony and started again immediately afterwards.

This one left its memories, too. Such as: The glittering array of stadiums and competitive venues. The organizing committee had a large slice of the state-operated football pools with which to work and not even the ancient Greeks dreamed of such lavish use of marble and statues. Just having the floor level concession could have made a man wealthy.

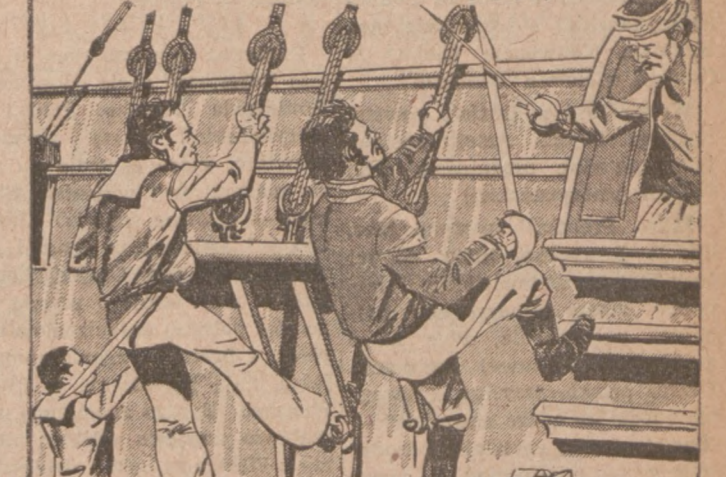

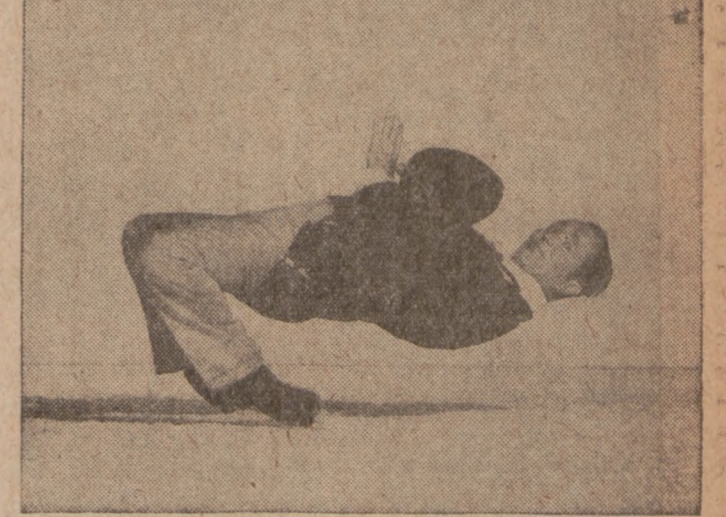
