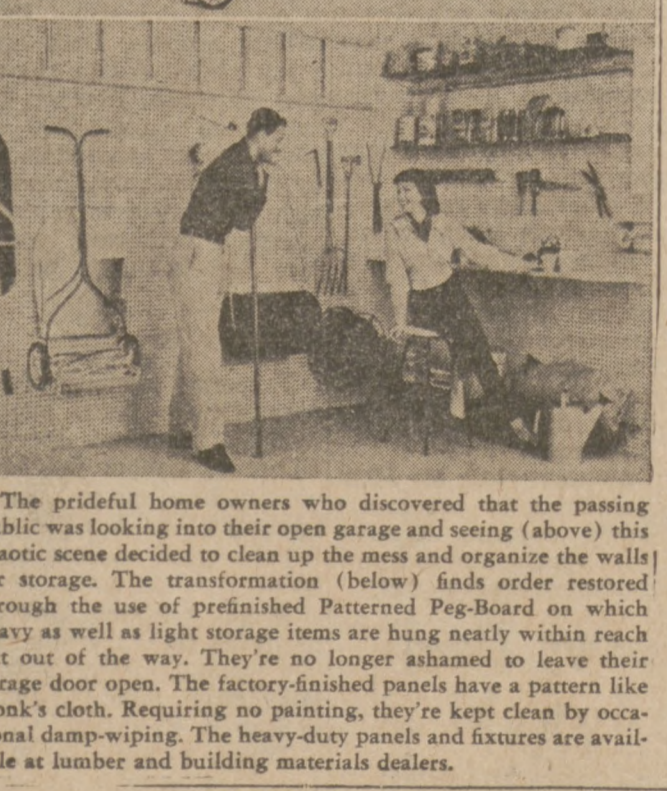

### Commencement Address PNA Is Symbol Of Superb Service, States Cardinal Krol At Alliance College

Cambridge Springs, Pa. (Sp.) — As we have already reported on this page, the principal address during the commencement exercises at Alliance College was delivered by John Cardinal Krol, Archbishop of Philadelphia.

In the first part of his address Cardinal Krol defined the contributions his generation made in the total field of human relations. The second part deals with the bright promise that lies ahead of the 1967 graduates. Referring to Alliance College and its parent organization, the Polish National Alliance, the Cardinal stated that these institutions are symbols of superb service.

**HIS EMINENCE** said: — The duties of love you owe God, a sense of your own value and that of other human beings — these are foundation stones of a sound education, the protection you have from a vague, sentimental kind of humanism. Yet, there are obstacles to such values — prejudices common to the society in which you have grown up, which may wither your sense of Christian love.

**YOU ARE PART** of an age which is bright with promise. This may sound like a mere cliché and yet this must be repeated again and again, to make you capable of hope and conviction that God gave you the capacity to make the world better if your life is to complete that promise.

You have a responsibility to the Church — to help it to do God's work. It was my generation that under the inspiration of the Holy Spirit, and through action of the supreme authority in the Church introduced the age of renewal. Will you have the patience to continue that renewal in an orderly fashion?

**THERE ARE TENSIONS** in the Church — but tension is a sign of life, a sign of change. Renewal and order are not incompatible. Neither are freedom and authority. In fact, the exercise of freedom requires the protection of authority. Authority must be exercised wisely and justly. The exercise of authority is subject to criticism, but the existence of authority cannot be denied. Neither can we presume to follow a course of selective obedience; to obey only those directions which please us. Such a course is not one of obedience but of concurrence, which eliminates both authority and obedience. This opens the road to anarchy, which may destroy your children, if not you in your generation.

May I illustrate the point? Two years ago, the parents of a fifteen-year old boy insisted that their son should have full freedom in selecting the books he would read. No effort was made to guide, direct, or restrict the boy, who was an avid reader. After two years, at the age of seventeen, the boy became listless, depressed, disinterested in school, friends, and even family. He summed up his feeling to his parents: "What's the use? What does it all mean anyway?"

In their well intentioned desire to help the son's development, the parents plunged him into waters over his head, before he could swim. They failed to provide the reasonable guidance which is demanded by the limitations of youth. This example is not adduced as an argument for smothering paternalism, but to illustrate that in life, freedom and guidance, the values of past and the realities of the present must be blended and balanced properly.

a challenge which every parent, teacher, indeed every Bishop must meet as wisely as possible. There has always been and probably always will be mutual criticism between older and younger generations, between parents and children, between teachers and students, between management and labor, between those in authority and those who are under authority. These different points of view must be measured on the touchstone of charity.

When concern for order leads to inactivity, and caution leads to repression or when eagerness for change leads to impatience and intolerance the possibility of healthy change is diminished. Intolerance for a valid but different point of view is but a refined version of the attitude which filled the gas chambers of Auschwitz (Oświęcim).

**MAY I IN THIS** connection point to your own motto and to its sponsoring parent, the Polish National Alliance as symbols of superb service to mankind. You know the history of both. The Alliance was founded as a fraternal organization in 1880 to provide service to immigrants. It adopted a policy of non-denominationalism and, while it was concerned about the material and social welfare of its organizational life, it declared war on intellectual poverty. Its Department of Education "WYDZIAŁ OŚWIATY" launched a wide variety of programs to help the Polish immigrant to become literate, to become active and influential in the main stream of life of their adopted country. This continuing concern led to an action at the 1903 Polish National Alliance Convention in Wilkes Barre of assessing a penny a month to create a school fund to give all Americans an opportunity to learn the history, the literature, the language and the tradition of Poland. This continued interest led to the purchase of a hotel in Cambridge Springs in September 4, 1911, and the opening of your Alliance College in September of 1912. Both the Polish National Alliance and Alliance College are symbols of concern for neighbor. Both are symbols of promoting the knowledge and love of one's national, religious and cultural heritage.

**AS I AM BEING** honored by the College, I take this occasion to pay deserved tribute to the Polish National Alliance and to the Alliance College for the sustained effort to help Americans of both Polish and non-Polish origin to know, to appreciate and to love the people of Poland. It is this type of fraternal concern which has helped the aggressive integration of Poles and their culture into the mainstream of American life.

Despite the tensions and uncertainties of our times, you as a generation have given every sign of accepting the challenges of the day. It is gratifying to witness your interest, your willingness to make personal sacrifices for the good of humanity. The various volunteer organizations such as the Peace Corps are a great tribute to the youths of our nation.

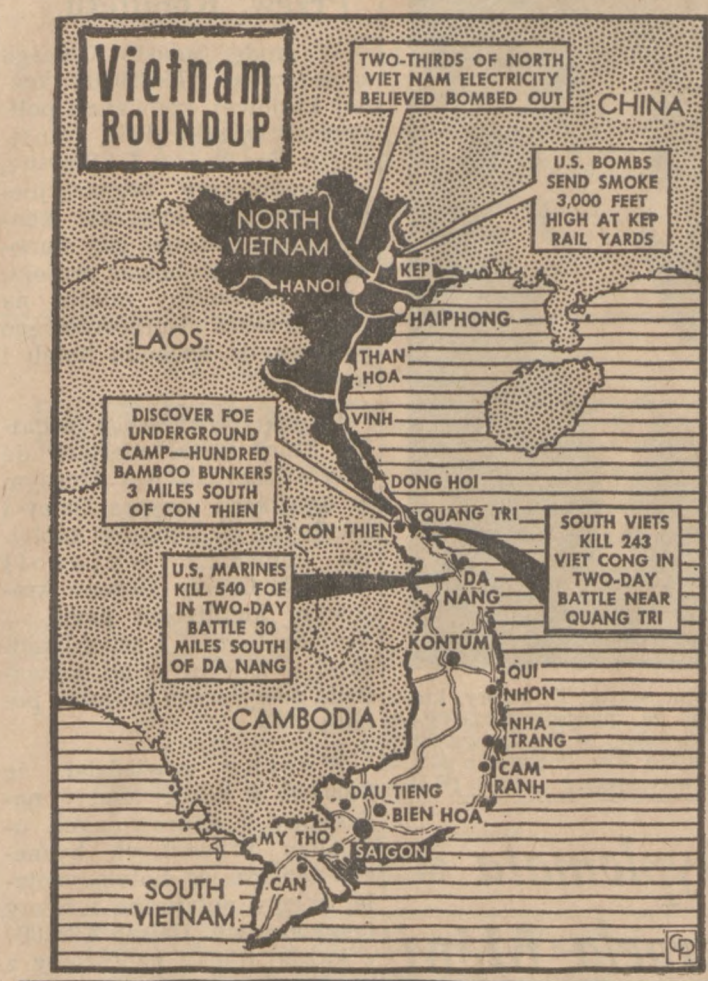
**WHAT JOHN KENNEDY** said of our generation expresses our hope for you:

"Let the word go forth from this time and place, to friend and foe alike, that the torch has been passed to a new generation of Americans, born in this century, tempered by war, disciplined by a hard and bitter peace, proud of our ancient heritage, and unwilling to witness or permit the slow undoing of those human rights to which this nation has always been committed."

**THE WORLD IS** truly charged with the grandeur of God. It awaits the electric energy of a generation that cares. A generation that has hopes. A generation that has courage and willingness to try. The world awaits your generation. May God grant you the courage to supply that energy for His glory and the wisdom to see His plan in all creation and to apply your knowledge for the sake of your happiness and the good of all mankind.

#### Students' Outlook

### Service Jobs Boom For Young Careerists

(Editors: The following is the second of three dispatches taking a look at salary and opportunities in jobs as young people move out of high school and start choosing a career.)

Washington (UPI) — Here is what the Bureau of Labor Statistics, the U.S. Department of Labor forecasts in several job fields for high school youths preparing to choose a career.

The service occupations constitute the fastest-growing field of employment in the American economy. During the coming decade, at least 4 million new jobs are expected to open up in this field.

**THE PRINCIPAL** categories are: —Private household workers. These include maids, cooks, nurses, laundresses, companions, housemen, butlers and chauffeurs. Pay scales range up to more than \$70 a week for a live-in cook, and as much as \$125 a week for a butler/chauffeur. —Protective service. This category includes police, firemen, building guards and night-watchmen. There are nearly a million such jobs in the United States. Training with pay is provided for qualified applicants. Pay scales, once low, have been improving steadily. Police rookies on the average receive \$100 a week or more, with salaries ranging to more than \$20,000 a year for top officials in metropolitan departments.

—Barbers and beauty operators. Job prospects are rated moderate to good during the years immediately ahead. Most states require licenses, which are available only to those who can demonstrate they've had the necessary training in a vocational school. Weekly earnings, including tips, generally range from \$65 to \$150.

**THE UNITED STATES** is suffering from an acute shortage of trained manpower in nearly all of the health professions. Employment opportunities are excellent for physicians, registered nurses, practical nurses, physical therapists, occupational therapists, X-ray technicians, laboratory technologists, dietitians, and dental hygienists.

These jobs require varying degrees of professional training. A person with a high school diploma and a few months of special training can qualify as a licensed practical nurse. A physician may need 9 to 12 years of post-high school education, internship and residency.

**PHYSICIANS** are the highest-paid professional group in America, by a wide margin. The average doctor earned \$19,000 last year. Pay scales in other health professions are related to the amount of specialized training required. All would qualify as relatively well-paid lines of work.

**A WIDE VARIETY** of careers are open to young men and women with an aptitude for science. In the field of biological or life sciences, there are careers as botanists, microbiologists, zoologists, biophysicists, embryologists, entomologists, geneticists, horticulturists, nutritionists, pathologists, pharmacologists and physiologists.

The earth sciences offer careers to geologists, geophysicists, meteorologists and astronomers.

Employment prospects are rated good to excellent in all of these

fields during the coming decade. An A. B. degree is the minimum educational requirement, with a master's degree necessary for many entry positions, and a Ph.D. highly desirable for anyone who aspires to full professional status.

Starting salaries for those with some graduate training range upward from \$7,000 a year. The median annual salary is around \$11,000, with about 10 per cent earning \$20,000 or more.

**CAREERS** in engineering are almost as diverse as those available in science. More than 25 engineering specialties are now recognized by the profession and in college curriculums. A bachelor's degree in engineering (which takes 5 years to acquire in some leading schools) is the minimum educational requirement, and there is increasing emphasis on advanced degrees.

Starting salaries range upward from about \$8,000 a year. A 1964 survey by the Bureau of Labor Statistics showed that the median salary of engineers with more than 20 years experience was about \$14,500 a year, with only 10 per cent earning less than \$10,500, and more than 10 per cent earning \$20,000 or more.

### Poles Came To Bethlehem In 1910; Descendants Number Over 10,000

Driven by impoverished conditions on the farms in Poland, people from that country came to the United States around 1910 in search of security and a more lucrative future in industry, many finding their dreams in the Lehigh Valley, Pa.

Most of the Polish immigrants found work in the Bethlehem Steel Co. and the Wire Mill in Allentown, Pa. Their descendants in this area number approximately 10,000 at present.

#### In Poland Today

### Writer Visits Kisielice In The Olsztyn Province

(Editor's note: — Henry Kamm, the New York Times correspondent visited land formerly known as East Prussia. After its return to Poland, the land became known administratively as Województwo Olsztynskie, Voivodship of Olsztyn with its seat in the city of Olsztyn. In the southwest corner of the Olsztyn Voivodship is the town of Kisielice which Mr. Kamm visited and wrote the following impressions.)

Kisielice, Poland — The Roman Catholic church stands lonely on a knob overlooking the scattered houses of this small farming town. Cows graze around it.

It used to be a Protestant church, and it stood on the market square at the end of the town's main street, which led up the hill. Where the cows graze, there were the shops and inns and offices of a county seat.

That was before January, 1945, before the Soviet Army took Freystadt, as the town was known in its German past, burned most of it and left it to Polish rule and Roman Catholics.

Benjamin Loch and his wife, Wanda, have lived in the same house on the edge of town since 1936. They were Germans then. They are Poles now. The choice was theirs, and they do not regret it.

"This is where we lived, and this is where we will live," said Mr. Loch in his broad East Prussian German, "unless they throw us out — and I don't believe any one will."

At 70, Mr. Loch looks at ease in his surroundings. His eyes are bright, and his skin is smooth.

**EVERY SQUARE** inch of the two large gardens behind his little home produces vegetables, fruit or flowers. There are pigs, chickens, ducks and geese.

Mr. Loch and his wife, who is 66, do all the work as they have always done.

The change in Kisielice's nationality has brought only one lasting regret to Mr. Loch, he said. His Polish is not very good. "I can't understand everything in church," he said, fingering the metal buttons with the Polish eagle on his jacket, which once was part of a state employee's uniform.

**PROTESTANT** services are now held in a small chapel a few miles from town, in Polish, although congregation and preacher are of German origin. To compensate, Mr. Loch listens to religious services

broadcast from Berlin on the radio in his kitchen—Catholic, Protestant and Jewish.

Mr. Loch is retired from a job as an electrician, but he still goes to work early every morning at the local dairy, in addition to tilling his gardens and the new field he has just leased from the town.

He had been a master electrician, a job that introduced him to some of the big men of the old Germany. Kisielice lies in the region where many of the great Prussian junkers had their estates. Mr. Loch installed electricity in their houses.

**THE FARMS** throughout this area that once was East Prussia look well-tended right up to the unmanned frontier with the Soviet Union. Much timber is being felled in the vast forests, but extensive plantings of sapplings give evidence of thoughtful management.

Houses often look rundown. Building materials are still not easy to obtain for private dwellings. But even ramshackle houses are frequently crowned by television aerials.

### TIMELY TOPICS

#### It Happened In June

##### PEARL S. BUCK

On June 26, 1892, Pearl Sydenstricker Buck, famous American novelist, was born at Hillsboro, West Virginia. Taken in infancy to China by her missionary parents, she made her home there until 1913. In 1914 she was graduated from Randolph-Macon College in Virginia, a three years later married John Lossing Buck, who like herself was a Presbyterian missionary in China. Pearl Buck's first novel, East Wind, West Wind, was published in 1930. This was followed a year later by The Good Earth, which won the Pulitzer Prize and the Howells Medal of the American Academy of Arts and Letters. She resigned as a missionary in 1933. Other novels, some with Chinese backgrounds, have appeared at frequent intervals. Pearl S. Buck was awarded the Nobel Prize for literature in 1938. Her work has contributed much to racial tolerance and Western understanding of Oriental customs and problems.

was appointed by President Theodore Roosevelt as chairman and chief engineer of the Isthmian Canal Commission. In this capacity Goethals became mainly responsible for the success of the project. He overcame serious difficulties concerning engineering problems, employee relations, housing and sanitation, and the enforcement of law and order. In 1914 he was made first Civil Governor of the Panama Canal Zone and promoted to the rank of Major General. With America's entrance into World War I, Goethals became general manager of the Emergency Fleet Corporation and later was recalled to active duty in the army as director in charge of supply and transportation of all United States troops at home and abroad. He died in New York City in 1928.

##### PHILADELPHIA CAMPAIGN

On June 30, 1777, in the early years of the Revolutionary War, Sir William Howe withdrew the British troops from New Jersey to Staten Island, New York. General Howe was in command of about 32,000 men, almost a fourth of whom were German mercenaries. This move was part of Howe's plan for an attack on Philadelphia by sea, using the transport vessels of his brother, Admiral Lord Richard Howe. About a month later, General Howe embarked from New York with 15,000 troops, sailed up Chesapeake Bay and landed at Head of Elk. George Washington, with about 10,500 men, took up a defensive position barring the way to Philadelphia on the eastern side of Brandywine Creek. After two hard-fought battles which ended in temporary defeat for the Americans, the Continental Congress was forced to flee from Philadelphia, and Howe occupied that city on September 26th, three months after beginning his campaign.

##### F. D. R.'S FIRST NOMINATION

On June 27, 1932, the Democratic Party Convention met at Chicago and three days later nominated Franklin Delano Roosevelt, Governor of New York, as its candidate for President on the fourth ballot. Breaking the tradition that a Presidential nominee must await formal notification of his selection, Roosevelt flew from Albany to Chicago and delivered an acceptance speech stressing the need for the reconstruction of the nation's economy. "I pledge you, I pledge you myself," he told the convention, "to a new deal for the American people." During the campaign, Roosevelt delivered numerous speeches in which he set forth a far-reaching program of economic and social reform. His promise of "direct, vigorous action," keynoted his first administration, which was largely concerned with "New Deal" economic and social legislation to overcome the depression.

### Cancer Detection

Ann Arbor, Mich. (UPI)—Cancer of the mouth and throat could be detected more readily if doctors would take just one simple step when they examine a person, a throat doctor has suggested.

Dr. Roger Boles of the University of Michigan said many cancers could be found sooner if doctors would use that woden stick they use to hold down a patient's tongue for one more thing. He said they should also lift up the tongue and look under it.

"When the tongue blade is used as a tongue depressor it unfortunately structures on the floor of the mouth by flattening and spreading the tongue over them," he said.

### To The Taste

East Lansing, Mich. (UPI) — Science has nearly perfected chemical compounds that might provide a valuable tool for overweight persons forced to diet. The chemicals are "taste inhibitors that can alter a person's taste buds to make sweets sour and tart foods taste sweet."

Dr. L. M. Beidler of Florida State University told a meeting of scientists that the taste buds can be deadened or changed for 30 minutes to an hour and, in a few years, for even longer periods of time.

Thus a person wanting to cut down on candy might change his taste to sour and his favorite candy bar would taste like a green apple.

# Uniwersytet Chicago Suspenduje 58 Studentów Za "Studium" Poboru

## Zawieszenie Do Nauki Obejmuje 1-szy Kwartał Jesienny 1967 r. Dla Studentów Niegraduacyjnych i Kwartały Letni i Jesienny — Dla Studentów Graduacyjnych z Tej Liczby 58-u.

Uniwersytet of Chicago ogłosił w środę o zasuspendowaniu uprawnień do nauki dla 58 studentów, którzy 29 maja wzięli udział w "studium" studenckim w budynku administracyjnym Uniwersytetu.

Studium to zwolone było przez pewną część studentów jako forma protestu wobec władz uniwersyteckich, iż te nie wzięły akcji po myśli domagań się studentów, by administracja Uniw. zaprzęta przedstawiania klasyfikacji studentów w nauczaniu starych się o odroczenia od poboru, — do Komisji Poborowych.

Zasuspendowanie studentów zostało nałożone przez Dziekana Studentów Warnera A. Wick, działającego na zlecenie i Dyscyplinarnego Komitetu fakultetu Uniwersytetu. Zasuspendowanie odnosi się do jesiennego kwartału 1967 roku dla studentów niegraduacyjnych przedmiotów z tych 58 studentów oraz obejmuje kwartały letni i jesienny — dla studentów graduacyjnych.

W odniesieniu do studentów pierwszego roku, zasuspendowanie ma być odłożone, jednakże fakt zawieszenia ma być zanotowany w rekordach akademickich tych studentów.

W ten sposób studenci, którzy byli związani z wspomnianą wyżej akcją będą podlegali poborowi w okresie kiedy suspendowani zostają w swych uprawnieniach studenckich.

Władze Uniwersyteckie oświadczyły, iż studenci mogą wnieść od tego zarządzenia apelację do dziekana studentów.

Jeden ze studentów graduacyjnych na wydziale biologii Howard N. Machtinger określił zasuspendowanie zbyt surową karą w odniesieniu do popełnionego przestępstwa i oświadczył, iż akcja studentów w czasie ich studium nie przeszkodziła pracy w budynku administracyjnym. Studium było zarządzane wówczas, kiedy starania załatwienia tej sprawy przez władze uniwersyteckie nie przyniosły sukcesu. Machtinger określił, iż wciąż Uniwersytet nie przy-

klada uwagi na potrzeby studentów.

Inny student obserwator w Komitecie Dyscyplinarnym oświadczył, iż akcja studentów była nieprzemysłana i władze stanęły na tym punkcie, iż siedzenie to przeszkodziło w urzędowaniu administracji szkoły.

Dziekan Wick podkreślił również, iż akcja "studium" studentów była nieprzemysłana przez studentów, gdyż kwestia wysyłki klasyfikacji studentów w studiach naukowych będzie rozpatrywana przez U.S. Kongres i może być odwołana. Studenci wnieśli o tę klasyfikację protest i przedstawili rezolucję do władz Uniw. Później przedstawił swój mandat i domagał się od władz Uniw, zastosowania się do mandatu studentów.


