Dear Sir,

Since I had the pleasure of seeing you in Paris last October, I have not heard from you, though you gave me some hope that I should. Meanwhile, M^r. Guizot has undertaken the translation of Washington's Works here, as you have in Germany. I will be glad to hear from you what you are doing.

I send you with this a copy of the History of Ferdinand and Isabella by an American Gentleman, which has been published, at the same time, in Boston and in London. It is the most valuable specimen of historical writing, which has yet appeared in the United States; and if you should think fit, I will ask of you the favour to notice it in some respectable German literary Journal. 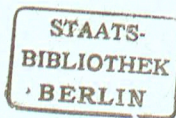
My dear Sir,
