

Warsaw Y Building

Here it is, completed at last, over \$900,000 and no debt, the largest YMCA building in Europe, attractive, popular, effective. Men's entrance and social rooms at the right, the same for boys at the left. The corner-stone of the budget for the huge work carried on in this building is the residence section, housing 177 men. Last year the physical department alone enrolled 4800 persons; this year they set a goal of 6500. The educational department enrolled 1010 last season; they want 1500 this year.

The central wing is one storey higher than the lateral wings; this is not seen from the street. The section of the building housing the two gyms, the pool, and the auditorium, being two stories lower, does not show at all in the picture. The full size of the building is not revealed from the front.


Poland has again won the Gordon-Bennet International Balloon Race, the fourth time.

Poland At The New York World's Fair, 1939

Polish participation in the New York 1939 World's Fair is planned on an extensive and interesting scale. The erection of the large building is in the hands of Cross & Cross of New York City. In the Hall of Science more than 200 inventions of Polish origin will be exhibited; at the center of the hall will be a replica of Thorwaldsen's Warsaw statue of the great Polish astronom Copernicus. A super-streamlined train, engine

and three coaches, of Polish design and manufacture, will form part of the technical exhibit.

Polish food is famous, one of the best kitchens in Europe, and these delicious dishes will be served in a replica of a noted 16th century Polish restaurant. Of "hors d'oeuvres" alone there are to be several hundred varieties. Ask for "chlodnik" for your soup course and "bigos" for your meat course. But the list of good and characteristic dishes is a long one.

Two of the big Polish days at the fair are to be May 3, a Polish national holiday, and October 11. Pulaski Day.

A Summer Success

Here is a most unusual thing. During the recent years of the depression the Krakow YMCA has accumulated a current expense debt of some eleven thousand dollars. Thinking the time had come to clear it off, a new finance committee of 8 of the leading men of the city was organized, in the very depths of the summer season. By September 15 about \$7000 was in hand or guaranteed, almost all of it in gifts larger than the Krakow YMCA has received in years. A first-class summer triumph.
